

Can store quilts in a locker

The best storage containers for quilts should always be cool and dry, as exposure to heat and humidity can damage the fabric. You should also store quilts away from light to prevent fading. ...

Store quilts away from sunlight, which can fade the fabric. Also avoid putting quilts in a humid area, like a basement or attic, because the moisture can damage the fabric and cause mildew, ...

Additionally, if the bag is not properly sealed or there is excessive pressure, the quilt's fibers can become distorted or crushed. The plastic itself can damage the quilt fibers. It is best to store your quilts inside of ...

Roll Quilts . If you have a safe place to store a long tube you can roll quilts for storage. This is another method that eliminates fold lines. Place a white sheet on the quilt top and roll towards the sheet layer--the quilt's ...

4. Thou shalt not store quilts in cedar or hope chests. Raw wood produces acid that is bad for textiles. 5. Thou shalt not store your quilt in a basement or attic. You will want to store your quilts in living areas of your ...

You can treat the wood to create a barrier, or you can line the shelves with white acid-free tissue paper. Cedar Chests with Cotton Pillow Cases. Cedar chests are not ideal places to store your quilts. The acid from the wood ...

Here are some storage don'ts: Do not store them in the basement or attic of your home where the temperature and humidity is not at ideal levels. Do not stack too many folded quilts on top of one another. That will ...

Store quilts flat in a dark area, and keep them off wood to avoid stains. And while attics and basements may be spacious, they're not quilt-friendly. Trust me, I've learned the hard way with one of my cherished baby quilts. Most of my quilts ...

Alternatively, you can fold your quilt, wrap it in a cotton sheet and store it on a closet shelf. For truly special quilts or long-term storage, get an acid-free box and acid-free tissue paper.
